

Western Views: Celebrating the American cowboy

The last Saturday of July (July 27th this year) is the National Day of the Cowboy.

The cowboy began in the Southwest. The Spanish created the first big ranches on the American continent, and the stockmen who worked the ranches developed their own tools and equipment for the job. As the Americans made their way into Texas and the Far West, the ways of the Vaquero were adapted and modified to fit the jobs at hand, and what we think of as the "American cowboy" was born.

Their era really began in the 1860s, deep in the heart of Texas. After the Civil War, the demand for beef was strong in the East, but the herds were in Texas. Some 5 million cattle were roaming the Texas plains, many of them unclaimed. A quick way for an enterprising rancher to make a buck was to gather a crew of tough young men and take them to Texas, where they could round up a herd and drive it north to the rails. These cattle were dangerous beasts, often half-wild from being left on the range while the ranchers were off fighting the war.

The tough young men who did this job were "cowboys." Some of them were veterans of the brutal Civil War, others were victims of it, displaced by years of terrible strife. They came from both sides of the conflict, but after a few months of sharing the hardship and dangers of the range, it didn't matter much



where they come from. Cowboy, 1887. They had diverse backgrounds and

them in ways nothing else could, because they had to rely on

each other to survive. They knew that the measure of man was not in his words, but in his actions.

Also, many of the cowboys really *were* just boys – at least, they were when they started out on the trail. The job was hard, dirty and dangerous. The boys – some as young as 12 years old – had to quickly become men.

Over the years, a Cowboy Code has grown, a code of ethics that the cowboys in the movies in the early 1900s promoted. Heroes like Tom Mix, Gene Autry, Hopalong Cassidy and the Lone Ranger all had their oaths and codes for youngsters to follow to help them strive for lofty ideals.

Nat Love, a black cowboy who was born a slave but went West after the war ended slavery, wrote his Cowboy Code in his autobiography. It was simple: "There a man's work was to be done, and a man's life to be lived, and when death was to be met, he met it like a man."

Words to live by. I'm Len Wilcox and that's the Western View.

CHICAGO (WLS) — Chicago police are looking for the suspect who swapped out the famous "Bean" art installation for



The famous Chicago Cloud Gate Sculpture, known to most as "the Bean," has been one of the city's most popular tourist destinations since its unveiling in 2004. Millennium Park, which houses "the

Bean," sees 12.9 million visitors each year, making it the mostvisited site in the midwestern United States.

Surveillance videos released last weekend show street artist and RV enthusiast, The Magical Froot, sneaking into Millennium Park around 3:03 a.m. CST, with a large metallic object covered with large pieces of canvas. Before police arrived at the scene, The Magical Froot had replaced "the Bean" with a custom-built Airstream, a popular classic travel trailer.

Police say they're unsure how the suspect got away with moving a 110-ton statue. Chief Deputy Garbanzo says, "It weighs about the same as 15 elephants, we're not sure how he moved that thing without anyone knowing where it went. Honestly, Chief Pinto and I are pretty impressed."



The police are offering a free 3-night stay in the new Airstream "Bean," to anyone who comes forward with any information. The new "Bean" comes equipped with two twin beds, a full bathroom with a slow-cooker-shaped bathtub, and, of course, a fully bean-stocked kitchen, with bacon in the fridge and maple syrup in the cupboard (which has **this recipe** taped to it).

GREAT TIPS TO HELP KEEP YOU AND YOUR RV FIRE-SAFE



RVs burn fast, without warning sometimes. It's critically important that RVers know how to prevent such fires and what to do if one should occur. Unfortunately, fire is

one of the leading causes of RV loss in the U.S. today. The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) estimates that 20,000 RV fires occur annually. Don't let yours be one of them! RV fires can start when your RV is moving or when it is parked. The following tips from the National Park Service can help you recognize the most common fire hazards.

Before you go

•Make a pre-trip checklist and inspect your RV every time you hit the road.

•Have three fire extinguishers for your RV-one in the kitchen, one in the bedroom, and one outside in an unlocked compartment or in your tow vehicle. Make sure every traveler

knows where they are located and how to use them. •Test your smoke detector.

•Have at least two escape routes and an escape plan. Practice it with your travelers.

•Make sure all travelers can open the front door, hatches, and emergency exits.

•Ensure that your RV's carbon monoxide and propane detectors are properly located and functioning.

•Spontaneous combustion can occur in damp charcoal. Before you travel, buy fresh charcoal, keep it dry, and store it in a covered metal container. •Ensure that the power cord for connecting your RV to a campground's electricity supply is in good condition and of suitable gauge wire to handle the electrical load. Replace damaged cords immediately.

RV Maintenance is important

•Have your RV's brakes checked. A dragging brake can create enough friction to ignite a tire or brake fluid.

•Bouncing down the road can loosen electrical connections, which can produce heat, and in turn, fire. Tighten them before your trip.

•Check all 12-volt connections before every trip. Many RV fires are caused by a 12-volt short.

•Leaking fluids in the engine compartment can ignite. During your pre-trip inspection, check all hoses for firmness, clamp tightness, and signs of leaking.

•Have repairs made before you travel.

•Mechanical or electrical failures cause roughly three-quarters of the highway vehicle fires. Proper maintenance will help reduce your chances of having malfunctions on the road.



Safety while driving



at least an eyeball check. Remember, a pressure gauge reading on hot tires is NOT accurate.

•Shut off the propane at the tank and turn off all propane-powered appliances while driving. If you have an accident or tire blowout while the propane is on, your injury and the damage to your vehicle can be significantly worse.

•If you elect to travel with the refrigerator operating on propane, you must turn it — and all appliances — off prior to entering a fuel stop. (FYI – Most refrigerators will keep food cold or frozen for eight hours without running while you travel.) •Be cautious of where you pull over and park. A hot exhaust pipe or catalytic converter can easily ignite dry grass underneath your RV.

Fire Safety while you are camping (or parked) •Never leave cooking unattended.

Never leave appliances that are plugged in and on unattended.
Turn off overhead exhaust fans when you leave the RV.
Don't leave 12-volt lights on. Keep clothing and other burnable things away from them (like in storage spaces). They get very hot.

•If the flame on your galley stove goes out while in use, unless you have run out of fuel, the gas will continue to flow and could result in an explosion. Turn off the stove and air out the RV before trying to relight.

•Keep all combustibles — from paper towels to curtains — far enough away from your stove that they cannot catch fire. •Gasoline and propane can pose an immediate, explosive danger. Deal at once with any leaks or spills, and use all fuels in adequately vented areas. Operate your generator in an area where gasoline fumes cannot reach an ignition source. •Keep your campsite fire sources, such as fire rings, tiki torches, and lanterns, away from all vehicles. •RVs often have a very limited number of electrical outlets, and sometimes RVers use powerstrips to plug in more things. Don't overload the electrical outlets! Circuit breakers don't always prevent overloads from starting fires!

•It's best never to use an extension cord in an RV. If you must, make sure you use a HEAVY DUTY extension cord, and make sure the load you put on it is well within its safe load capacity. DON'T run any electrical cord under a carpet or floor mat. If there is a fire

•The first step is to get everybody out of the RV and safely away from the fire.


•If it is a small fire and you can extinguish it without putting yourself in danger, put it out with a fire extinguisher.

•If it is too big of a fire or coming from an unknown source, do not risk your safety! Get out.

•Never re-enter a burning RV to retrieve anything — GET OUT & STAY OUT!

•Get help. ALL adults and older children should know how to

dial 911. •Remember that cell service may be limited where you are, so make a plan ahead of time. It's crucial to know your exact location so firefighters can find you.

"Absolutely," he said, without even pausing to think about it. Gail and carefully removed all the brown gunk and placed it on a towel, which you can see below. It was a shock to see it all in one place.

We changed our minds about replacing the heater. Gail asked me how long I had owned it, and I couldn't remember. It may have been 10 years. We figured that even if it were only half that old — knowing that space heaters can cause fires — we should play it safe and get a new one. We'll clean it once a year. We caught a lucky break on that old heater. If the cord hadn't been noticeably frayed, we may have used it for years to come. That might not have ended well.

Portable Space Heater

Most of us, I suspect, use a small, portable space heater in our RVs to supplement our onboard heater. For one thing, it saves propane. I've used such heaters for years. I'm aware that they can cause fires if they become defective or are positioned too close to something flammable. So I am very careful. So far, no



Portable space heaters are available in most big box stores for \$30 to \$50. They provide steady heat at high and low settings and can be placed wherever needed in the RV. Some RV parks prohibit the heaters. But in all my years of

<u>RVing</u>, I have never been asked even once if I were using one. Until three weeks ago, I never suspected that my trusty little cube heater was an accident waiting to happen, even a fire waiting to happen.

I had noticed that its cord was showing some wear. My immediate reaction was to toss it. But ever-frugal Gail suggested we simply buy a new cord. And so we zoomed over to Home Depot, paid a few dollars and were all set. The first step was to open up the heater to attach the cord. But look below at what we encountered when we did that! All that brown stuff is dirt, human hair, pet fur and other materials I couldn't begin to identify.
